





Capacity Building for Technology

What is capacity building?

Focused activities carried out in a set time period and designed to increase the capabilities, knowledge, and resources within an organization.

Why capacity building?

Process of building and strengthening the systems, structures, cultures, skills, resources, and power that organizations need to serve their communities. – Grantmakers for Effective Organizations


Grantmaking Trends



Hewlett Foundation found DEI was top topic for foundations in 2020









Distinction emerging between short-term capacity building and longer-term organizational development

What is your critical need for growth or change in technology?

Common Grant Application Process



Work with fundraising team to identify need



Research: Identify the right grant opportunities that align with your organization's mission and goals.



Eligibility: Check the eligibility criteria and ensure that your organization meets the requirements.



LOI: Screening tool for eligibility, strength, and fit with priorities



Full application: Invitation to expand on details



Site visit: virtual or on-site

Full application

- Organizational Strengths
- Community opportunities and benefits
- Project plan with clear goals, objectives, outcomes, timeline, budget, and work plan
- Evaluation Plan
- Sustainability Plan

Opportunity, not a problem




Urgent organizational priority, tied to strategic plan
